Favela Street Kid: The Story of Little Pele





Read the first chapter carefully.

Chapter 1

The mid-afternoon sun was hot and unforgiving in the favela. In this heat, roads melted and the sand burned your feet. 
Sell the papayas or score in a World Cup final? Hmm, it was a tough choice...

Explain two features of his character, using evidence from the text to support your answer. [3 marks] /

To earn all <u>three</u> marks, you need to use two adjectives to describe Little Pele's <u>character</u> and give evidence about at least one of them.

Remember, it's about what you have inferred about Little Pele's character; what words would you use to describe his personality?



The <u>acceptable points</u> that you could have given were that Little Pele seemed...

AP1 hardworking

AP3 passionate/fanatical about football

AP2 caring/devoted/ concerned for his family

AP4 upbeat/optimistic

To be awarded 3 marks, you needed to give two acceptable points, at least one with evidence.

Give evidence by using causal conjunctions like...

AP1 hardworking

AP3 passionate/fanatical about football

AP2 caring/devoted/ concerned for his family

AP4 upbeat/optimistic

I can tell that he is hardworking **since** he's out in the heat trying to sell papayas to the tourists. He also seems very upbeat despite having a tough life. [AP1 + evidence, AP4]

Little Pele is devoted to his family **because** he is willing to work on the rubbish dumps to pay for food for them. He is obsessed with football – it's his life. [AP2 + evidence, AP3].
